WASHAKIE COUNTY PUBLIC HEALTH ORDER 2020-1

COUNTYWIDE VARIANCE TO THE RESTRICTIONS MANDATED IN STATEWIDE PUBLIC HEALTH ORDER #1: THIRD CONTINUATION AND MODIFICATION OF STATEWIDE PUBLIC HEALTH ORDER CLOSING BARS, RESTAURANTS, THEATERS, GYMNASIUMS, CHILD CARE FACILITIES, K-12 SCHOOLS, COLLEGES, UNIVERSITIES, AND TRADE SCHOOLS STATEWIDE

WHEREAS, Dr. Edward Zimmerman, MD serves as the Washakie County Health Officer pursuant to Wyo. Stat. Ann. § 35-1-306(a); and

WHEREAS, Wyo. Stat. Ann. § 35-1-240(a)(i), (ii), and (iv) gives the power to the Wyoming Department of Health, through the State Health Officer, or under her direction and supervision, or through the other employees of the Wyoming Department of Health to control the causes of communicable disease; to close theaters, schools, and other public places; and to forbid gatherings of people when necessary to protect public health; and

WHEREAS, as evidenced by her signature below, Alexia Harrist, MD, PhD, the Wyoming State Health Officer, has reviewed and does hereby authorize the issuance of this Variance Order by Dr. Zimmerman, the Washakie County Health Officer, and the State Health Officer, Dr. Alexia Harrist, also specifically makes the finding that this Order is necessary for the protection of the public health; and

WHEREAS, the State Health Officer has issued Statewide Order #1 closing bars, restaurants, theaters, gymnasiums, child care facilities, K-12 schools, colleges, universities, and trade schools statewide; and

WHEREAS, Statewide Order #1 is specifically titled: Third Continuation and Modification, of Statewide Public Health Order #1: Closing Bars, Restaurants, Theaters, Gymnasiums, Child Care Facilities, K-12 Schools, Colleges, Universities, and Trade Schools Statewide. Statewide Order #1 originally was to expire on April 3, 2020, however, it was extended by the First Continuation Order to April 17, 2020. The Second Continuation Order extended Statewide Order #1 to April 30, 2020. The Third Continuation Order now extends the order until May 15, 2020, and allows for a County Health Officer to request a less restrictive or more restrictive variance to the order; and

WHEREAS, COVID-19 was first detected in Wuhan, China in 2019, and since then has spread throughout the world including to the United States, the State of Wyoming and Sheridan County; and

WHEREAS, COVID-19 is a respiratory illness, transmitted through person-to-person contact or by contact with surfaces contaminated with the virus. Persons infected with COVID-19 may become symptomatic two to fourteen days after exposure. The symptoms of COVID-19 include fever, cough, and shortness of breath. In some cases, COVID-19 can result in severe disease including hospitalization, admission to an intensive care unit, and death, especially among older adults (age 65 and older) and persons with serious underlying health conditions; and

WHEREAS, the World Health Organization declared COVID-19 a worldwide pandemic as of March 11, 2020; and

WHEREAS, on March 13, 2020, the President of the United States declared a national emergency concerning the coronavirus, specifically stating that, in "December 2019 a novel (new) coronavirus known as SARS-Co V-2 ("the virus") was first detected in Wuhan, Hubei Province, People's Republic of China, causing outbreaks of the coronavirus disease (COVID-19) that has now spread globally [...] The spread of COVID-19 within our Nation's communities threatens to strain our Nation's healthcare systems [...] Additional measures [...] are needed to successfully contain and combat the virus in the United States;" and

WHEREAS, on March 13, 2020, Wyoming Governor Mark Gordon declared a State of Emergency and Public Health Emergency in the State of Wyoming, and the State of Wyoming is experiencing a public health emergency in response to the evolving COVID-19 outbreak; and

WHEREAS, Governor Gordon's Declaration of a State of Emergency and Public Health Emergency directs the Wyoming Department of Health to take all appropriate and necessary actions, and that in the judgment of the Director of the Wyoming Department of Health, any actions necessary should be taken to provide aid to those locations where there is a threat or danger to public health, safety and welfare; and

WHEREAS, a significant number of Wyoming citizens are at risk of serious health complications, including death, from COVID-19. Although most individuals who contract COVID-19 do not become seriously ill, people with mild symptoms, and even asymptomatic people, place other vulnerable members of the public at significant risk; and

WHEREAS, a large number of persons with serious infections can compromise the ability of the healthcare system to deliver the necessary healthcare to the public; and

WHEREAS, in addition to the above findings, stopping the spread of COVID-19 includes washing hands often, practicing physical distancing by avoiding close contact with others, staying at least six feet away from someone who is ill or showing signs of

illness, avoiding touching your faces, eyes, nose, and mouth, covering your cough or sneeze into your elbow or by using a tissue, and wearing a face covering in public; and

WHEREAS, the Wyoming Department of Health has issued data-driven decision-making metrics to inform public health orders that include the following: Number of positive cases, percent of cases attributed to community spread, percent of total tests that are positive, total reported COVID-19 hospitalizations, total reported hospital bed capacity, total ICU bed availability, daily COVID-19 testing volume, testing capacity, PPE supplies; and COVID-19 outbreaks in communal settings; and

WHEREAS, due in part to the vigilance of Washakie County residents, the metrics measuring outbreak process and healthcare system capacity allow for Washakie County to request incrementally lifting certain restrictions. Washakie County has implemented a process to measure the metrics outlined by Governor Mark Gordon and State Health Officer Alexia Harrist that must be considered when requesting variances. These metrics have been and will be measured and reviewed on an ongoing basis; and

WHEREAS, as of May 3, 2020, the number of laboratory confirmed positive cases in Washakie County is 5 with all 5 cases having recovered, and no deaths from COVID-19. There are no laboratory confirmed active cases in Washakie County currently. Washakie County also tracks probable cases of which all 3 have recovered; and

WHEREAS, as of May 3, 2020, the State of Wyoming data show a total of 76 resulted COVID-19 tests from Washakie County with an overall positive test rate of 8% and a positive test rate within the last two weeks of 0%.

NOW THEREFORE, IT IS HEREBY ORDERED THAT residents of Washakie County, including the City of Worland and Town of Ten Sleep, shall comply with Statewide Order #1 (Third Continuation and Modification, of Statewide Public Health Order #1: Closing Bars, Restaurants, Theaters, Gymnasiums, Child Care Facilities, K-12 Schools, Colleges, Universities, and Trade Schools Statewide) with the following exceptions:

- 1. Restaurants, food courts, cafes, coffeehouses, bars taverns, brew pubs, breweries, microbreweries, distillery pubs, wineries, tasting rooms, special licensees, clubs, and other places of public accommodation offering food, beverages, or alcoholic beverages for on-premises consumption may operate with the following restrictions:
 - a. Businesses shall notify the Washakie County Health Officer via the Washakie County COVID-19 Incident Management Team (covid19@washakiecounty.net or 307-347-3331) that they intend to open and provide their COVID-19-specific operating plans to the County Health Officer for his approval prior to operating under this variance;

- b. All patrons of the business shall be seated at a table;
- c. Tables must be limited to groups of 6, preferably of the same household;
- d. Tables with guests must be positioned so that guests at different tables are at least 6 feet apart from each other when seated;
- e. Signage must be maintained to remind individuals from separate parties to stand at least 6 feet apart; waiting areas must have floor markers to indicate proper spacing;
- f. Businesses shall assure that social distancing guidelines are maintained while customers enter and remain in the establishment;
- g. Staff shall wear face coverings at all times and perform hand hygiene between interactions with each table;
- h. Cups, lids, napkins, and straws must be handed directly to customers by staff;
- i. Staff shall avoid touching items that have been placed on the table; the table must be cleared by dedicated staff once all guests have left the table;
- j. Dedicated staff shall sanitize the area occupied by customers upon departure including tables, menus, pens, salt and pepper shakers, tables, chairs, etc. (considering the use of disposable items if necessary);
- k. Businesses may not operate if PPE, EPA-approved disinfectants and sanitizers, soap and other necessary cleaning supplies are not available;
- 1. Hand sanitizer must be available immediately adjacent to bathrooms;
- m. Businesses shall clean and disinfect in the morning, afternoon, and evening; all tables, chairs, door handles, floors, bathrooms and any high-touch surfaces must be cleaned and disinfected.
- n. No self-serve food service or buffet options may be available unless food is pre-packaged; drink refills are not allowed in the same containers;
- o. To-go boxes, pizza boxes, paper cups, and any other paper product that touches food must be treated as food;
- Staff shall use gloves when handling ready-to-eat foods (including ice);
 gloves are not required when handling foods that have yet to be cooked;
- q. Employees must be screened for symptoms of COVID-19 or exposure to an individual with COVID-19 prior to each shift; employees with symptoms or exposure shall not be allowed to work; logs must be kept and available for inspection by the local health officer;

- r. Self-service condiments should be eliminated unless they can be cleaned adequately in between customers;
- s. Businesses should encourage contactless and non-signature payment; if not possible, card and payment stations must be sanitized after each use; staff shall sanitize hands between handling payment options and food containers;
- t. Businesses shall maintain a record of customer usage, by date and time, and a record of staff working hours, by date and time for purposes of COVID-19 tracing, in the event that contact tracing is necessary; if this record keeping is done manually, sanitizing measures must be taken on the instruments used for record keeping in between use; and
- u. Playgrounds in businesses must remain closed.

IT IS FURTHER ORDERED that the Washakie County Health Officer may grant exceptions to this Countywide Variance to the Statewide Public Health Order # 1 on a case by case basis after evaluating the request and obtaining written approval from the State Health Officer; and

IT IS FURTHER ORDERED that this Countywide Variance to the Statewide Public Health Order # 1 shall remain in effect until such time that the Washakie County Health Officer enters a decision to revoke or modify this variance, under the direction and supervision of the State Health Officer; and

IT IS FURTHER ORDERED that any person or legal entity that violates this Countywide Variance to the Statewide Public Health Order # 1 may be subject to criminal prosecution under Wyo. Stat. Ann. §§ 35-1-105 and 35-1-106.
